Teddington Theatre Club

Formed in 1927, Teddington Theatre Club (TTC) is now one of the leading amateur drama groups in south west London, performing in their own custom-built theatre in Hampton Hill. Starting out to stage Shakespeare for schools, it soon developed to stage a wide repertoire of plays for the general public, originally to raise funds for its schools programmes.

TTC's first production, in 1927, was *Scenes from Twelfth Night* followed in 1928 with *The Merchant of Venice* and *Scenes from As You Like It*. Since then, the Club has gone on to put on over 670 productions and counting as it rapidly approaches its hundredth anniversary. Having performed four or five productions a year in hired halls for many years, in 1969 the Club was granted a lease of part of Richmond Council's Hampton Court House and after two years of conversion work finally opened its own theatre in 1971.

As the lease came towards its end, negotiations with Richmond Council secured a site on Hampton Hill High Street for a new theatre and after a concentrated period of fundraising and with a grant from the National Lottery, the well-equipped Hampton Hill Playhouse (now Theatre) was opened in 1998.

TTC present about ten productions a year and welcome new members - from those who wish to be on stage to the technical teams or front of house. All shows at the Theatre are supported by a huge team of volunteers – so thanks to all of those who have supported this show with marketing, front of house, bar, health & safety, box office, finance and more.

Welcome

Welcome to Hampton Hill Theatre and Teddington Theatre Company's production of Henrik Ibsen's iconic masterpiece *A Doll's House*. It's marvellous to see audiences back enjoying the unique communal experience of live theatre. Thank you.



My thanks also to Douglas Schatz, making his directorial debut, and to his committed, accomplished cast and creative team. Douglas has assisted on three TTC productions, including our only (to date) movie: Caryl Churchill's *Escaped Alone*, filmed between 2021 lockdowns (and directed by, ahem.... yours truly). Especial thanks to Fiona Auty, Harry Jacobs and Zoe Man - the latter having bestowed unstinting backstage support on all our 2022/23 shows.

First presented in the same year as Thomas Edison's light bulb, *A Doll's House* continues to cast a revealing ray upon marital relationships, society and sexual politics. More recently, actors as diverse as Ruth Gordon, Claire Bloom, Gillian Anderson and Jessica Chastain have assayed the pivotal role of Nora. Only last year, I saw the UK premiere, at London's Donmar, of Lucas Hnath's strippedback, bare-stage sequel: *A Doll's House, Part 2*.

As for TTC's continuing story, while we've a summer break onstage, behind the scenes there is no pregnant pause. We're already rehearsing Dario Fo's sadly still-timely satire *They Don't Pay? We Won't Pay!* and have just cast our rollicking half-term adaptation of Robert Louis Stevenson's classic *Treasure Island*. We then penetrate Peter Nichols's provocative comedy about sex, love and infidelity (appropriately titled *Passion Play*) before delivering our Christmas present: the pastiche-packed, madcap musical *Spamalot*.

Would you like to be more than a mere spectator at the feast? Then we'd love to hear from you! We welcome valiant volunteers to support, not just with acting, but stage management, lighting, sound, set, costume, props, production management and front of house. Director's Note

Henrik Ibsen's "modern tragedy", *A Doll's House*, premiered in Copenhagen in 1879, and is the first of his series of great late dramas that include *Ghosts, The Wild Duck* and *Hedda Gabler*. His daring, naturalistic representations of the realities underlying conventional social life changed the course of dramatic history.

The play shocked the critics on its debut, with producers in Germany and Britain compelled to change the ending to protect audiences from moral corruption. Curiously the British censor, Lord Chamberlain, passed the play because Nora's actions were deemed "too absurd altogether". Audiences however flocked to see it. What is it about a play written more than 140 years ago that touched such a nerve and continues to speak to us today?

Well, the outline of Nora and her husband Torvald's relationship, and the expectations of the society that they inhabit and which have shaped them, remain strikingly familiar. As Ibsen himself wrote in his time: "A woman cannot be herself in modern society," since it is "an exclusively male society, with laws made by men". It would be difficult to argue that this has fundamentally changed.

So the challenges that Nora and Torvald face to establish their happy home and independent identities are the same as we recognise in our modern lives. As testimony to the enduring relevance of this play - without giving away the story – I will simply say that during a recent run in London's West End, the lead actress stated that she and other cast members personally knew people in the audience who decided to change their lives after seeing this show. That is the power of theatre!

Thank you to an inspiring cast of actors who have made this such an enjoyable and rewarding experience, and to an amazingly creative and supportive crew. Special thanks to Matt Beresford, mentor and friend, for his wise counsel.

Madeleine Gordon – Kristine Linde

Maddie's last TTC performance was back in September 2015: *Colder Than Here*. Since then, she's done several productions both am dram and professional and has trained at East15 Drama School. When she's not performing, she has her own theatre company 'Slap 'n' Tickle' and has written and performed in two original



shows (*Meat Cabaret* - 2020, *Spit Me Out* - 2021), winning a critics award and a sponsored Edinburgh Fringe run respectively.

Owen Huxford - Nils Krogstad

This is Owen's first performance with Teddington Theatre Club. He previously studied GCSE drama and played the role of Sir Toby Belch and subsequently Malvolio in productions of *Twelfth Night* at school and university respectively. He has also performed in a collection of scenes from various operas as part of a



production by Oxford Opera Society, and has given recitals of lieder.

Dominic Lloyd - Dr. Rank

Dom had his first stage experience in the late 1980s. A chance conversation with a work colleague led to a role in Tony Harrison's *The Mysteries*. This was followed by the excitement of taking a show to the Edinburgh Fringe with Steven Berkoff's *Agamemnon*. Dom made his TTC debut last year. Since then, his roles have included the



thug Lambert and actor Peter in *Shakespeare in Love*, and as village copper Ernie Lauderdale in 1960s comedy *Maynard's End* for Q2. Most recently he has been seen as Alfred Doolittle in *Pygmalion*, and as scheming politician, Richard Sheridan, in *The Madness of George III*.

Liz Salaman - Anne-Marie

This is Liz's fifth TTC production and, as she had three Norwegian grandparents, it gives her great pleasure to have been cast in an Ibsen play. She previously appeared in the Studio in the 2016 production of *Stevie*, for which she received a Swan nomination, and then in 2018 in *Echoes of the War*. Appearances on the main stage include *Cause Célèbre* and *When We Are Married*. Liz



has also worked at RSS appearing in *Collaborators*, *Tom and Viv*, The *Railway Children* and another famous Ibsen play, *Hedda Gabler*.

Siân Walters - Helene

Siân made her stage debut aged five playing a snowflake and has been involved in all things theatrical ever since! She enjoys working on both sides of the curtain, so when not treading the boards can usually be found lurking in the wings dressed in black. Since joining TTC in 2012, Siân has performed in six pantomimes and several plays. Her most recent appearances were in *The Madness*



of George III and A Family Affair. In 'real life', she's owned by two cats, drinks too much tea, works in TV-land and is also a member of BROS Theatre Company.

Douglas Schatz - Director

A Doll's House is Douglas's debut as a director. He has previously been Assistant Director on the TTC productions of Our Country's Good and The Recruiting Officer, as well as on the filmed production of Escaped Alone. He formerly worked at the drama publisher Samuel French, and now contributes his publishing experience as Chairman of the TTC Programming Team. Douglas is also the founder and host of The Play Podcast, the first-ever episode of which was dedicated to A Doll's House.
