



Teddington Theatre Club

Formed in 1927, Teddington Theatre Club (TTC) is now one of the leading amateur drama groups in south west London, performing in their own custombuilt theatre in Hampton Hill. Starting out to stage Shakespeare for schools, it soon developed to stage a wide repertoire of plays for the general public, originally to raise funds for its schools programmes.

TTC's first production, in 1927, was Scenes from *Twelfth Night* followed in 1928 with *The Merchant of Venice* and Scenes from *As You Like It*. Since then, the Club has gone on to put on over 670 productions and counting as it rapidly approaches its hundredth anniversary. Having performed four or five productions a year in hired halls for many years, in 1969 the Club was granted a lease of part of Richmond Council's Hampton Court House and after two years of conversion work finally opened its own theatre in 1971.

As the lease came towards its end, negotiations with Richmond Council secured a site on Hampton Hill High Street for a new theatre and after a concentrated period of fundraising and with a grant from the National Lottery, the well-equipped Hampton Hill Playhouse (now Theatre) was opened in 1998.

TTC present about ten productions a year and welcome new members - from those who wish to be on stage to the technical teams or front of house. All shows at the Theatre are supported by a huge team of volunteers — so thanks to all of those who have supported this show with marketing, front of house, bar, health & safety, box office, finance and more.



Welcome

Welcome to Hampton Hill Theatre and Teddington Theatre Company's production of *Treasure Island*, or rather Jago Hazzard's laugh-out-loud, panto-esque, lovingly pirated adaptation of Robert Louis Stevenson's classic. Thank you for joining us. I do hope that you enjoy the voyage!



My thanks also to director Asha Gill and her innovative and irreverent cast and creative team for bringing Stevenson's iconic adventure story to turbo-charged life, 140 years after its first publication.

As Jago says on page six, Stevenson's book has had an incredible influence on popular culture's perception of pirates. More specifically, it has spawned well over 50 film and TV adaptations of *Treasure Island* and hundreds of stage versions, with famous cinematic *Long John Silver* including Wallace Beery, Orson Welles, Jack Palance, Charlton Heston, Tim Curry and Eddie Izzard: a dastardly if diverse crew, shiver me timbers.

Without doubt, the most renowned (and imitated) interpretation was that of Robert Newton in Walt Disney's first completely live-action film in 1950. Newton was born in Dorset, grew up in Cornwall, and his exaggerated West Country accent is credited, with considerable reason, for popularising the stereotypical 'pirate' voice, yarr! He later starred in the movie *Blackbeard the Pirate* in 1952 and reprised Silver two years later (in the blatantly Hollywood treasure-hunting, non-Stevenson-sourced sequel *Long John Silver*). Newton is now rightly the 'patron saint' of the annual International 'Talk Like a Pirate Day', which falls on 19th September — a date honoured on social media by tonight's cast and crew.



However, R L Stevenson was himself a magpie, gaining inspiration from sources as varied as Daniel Defoe's *Robinson Crusoe*, Walter Scott's *The Pirate* and Edgar Allan Poe's *The Gold-Bug*.

Moreover, Israel Hands was a real pirate serving under (and maimed by) Blackbeard, the smuggling 'Benbow Brandy Men' operated out of the real-life Benbow pub in Penzance (even though Stevenson's pub is actually set in Devon), and Silver himself was apparently based on Stevenson's one-legged friend and mentor, the writer William Ernest Henley. Oh, and Dr Livesey was probably based on Joseph Livesey, a famous nineteenth-century temperance advocate: so that teacup's not just a theatrical device.

As for TTC's own continuing creativity, as soon as tonight's half-term treat weighs anchor, we sashay into more 'adult' territory, next month, to penetrate Peter Nichols's provocative exploration of sex, love and infidelity (the appropriately titled *Passion Play*), before delivering our Christmas present: the pastiche-packed, marvellously madcap musical *Spamalot*. So an assorted abundance of theatrical delights to look forward to as we move through autumn to the close of another full-on year. I urge you to book your tickets now.


Our endeavours then continue unabated into 2024, with David Haig's *Pressure* and the UK premiere of Stephen Dolginoff's *Panic - A Live Radio Musical*, both playing in January and both directed by winners at this year's Arts Richmond Swan Awards. Then, in March, we put on our dancing shoes for both Richard Harris's hilarious and heart-warming evergreen *Stepping Out* and Anna Jordan's *Pop Music*: a rollercoaster ride of an anti-romantic wedding night.




Writer's Notes

Treasure Island (this play) came about because I wanted to write a silly play about pirates and ripping someone else's story off was easier than inventing my own. If you're going to rip a pirate story off, you can't do much better than *Treasure Island*, which between the novel and the various adaptations has given us every pirate trope from buried treasure and parrots to pirates who say "arrr." Robert Louis Stevenson hasn't complained yet, so I assume he's cool with it.

This play was originally a much shorter piece called *With Apologies to Treasure Island*, which Asha and I directed in 2013 with Youth Action Theatre, and ever since then we've talked about the idea of staging a longer version. So that's what we have now. The current show is totally revised and somehow even less true to the book, and of course I'm no longer apologising.

But of course, a play is a collaboration - it needs an excellent director at the helm and an excellent cast and crew to make it work, and that's what this show has. I'm really looking forward to seeing what they've made of it, and to claiming credit for their hard work. I hope you enjoy this evening of seafaring silliness and buffoonish buccaneers, by thunder, sa-ha and shiver-me-timbers, etc.





Mrs Hawkins – Nicola Doble

She also performs regularly with Richmond Shakespeare Society, with recent roles including Adriana in The Comedy of Errors, Myra Arundel in Hayfever and the Bishop of Ely/Dauphin of France in Henry V. She joined TTC in 2018 as Nell in *The Matchgirls* and has stayed for pantomimes such as *King Arthur in Space* where she played the loveable Lance. This however, is her first play as a pirate!






Nell Johnson - Joanna Taylor

Captain Flint / Ben Gunn – Josh Clarke

Josh has been heavily involved in theatre and performance from an early age and has no plans on stopping any time soon! He graduated from the University of Reading with a degree in Film & Theatre Studies. He joined YAT in 2013 and has been involved in many productions both at Hampton Hill and at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Josh joined TTC in 2017 for a production of Noel Coward's *Still Life* and his most recent on stage credits include - Tony in *Abigail's Party*, Salty in *Teechers* and Prince Charming in last December's *Guardians of the Pantoverse*. Josh is also a keen director, directing the Swan Award winning *Pornography* in 2019, *Bull* earlier this year and YATs 2023 Edinburgh Fringe Production of *The School For Scandal* in August.


Tom Morgan - Dominic Lloyd


